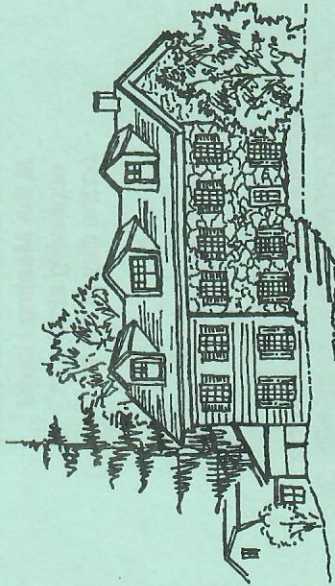




# 1 - Pennsdale Friends (Quaker) Meeting House

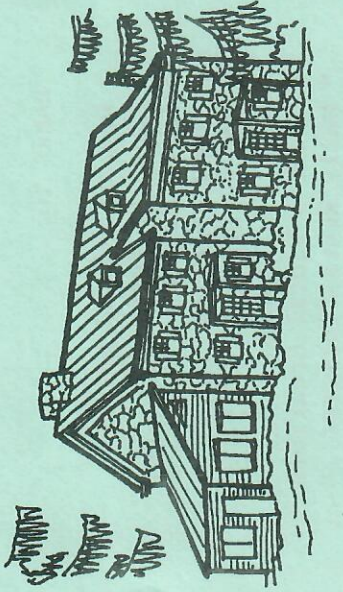
House tour tickets and comfort facilities are available here. Feel free to bring a picnic lunch and find a spot on the Meeting House lawn.

The Meeting House is the oldest standing house of worship in Lycoming County. The present stone structure was built in 1799 to replace an older log Meeting House which was destroyed by fire. Quakers from Germantown, Philadelphia, and Chester and Bucks Counties who settled the area worshipped here. Today, Friends from Pennsdale, Muncy, Williamsport, Milton and the surrounding areas practice Meeting for Worship in the traditional unprogrammed style.



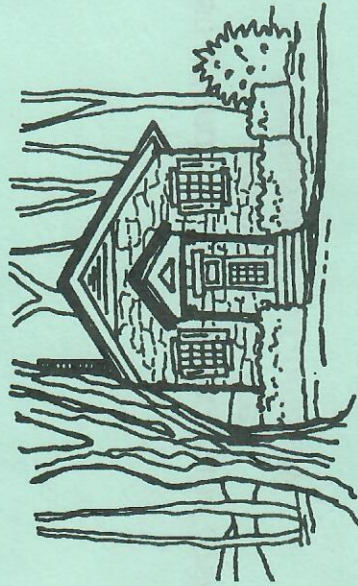
# 2 - Edgend or Wishing Well Farm

Built in 1799 by Samuel Wallis for his daughter Mary, who married the first physician in Lycoming County. Dr. Lathy handsomely restored and furnished it in period. This home is now owned and occupied by Dr. Michael Piccuta.



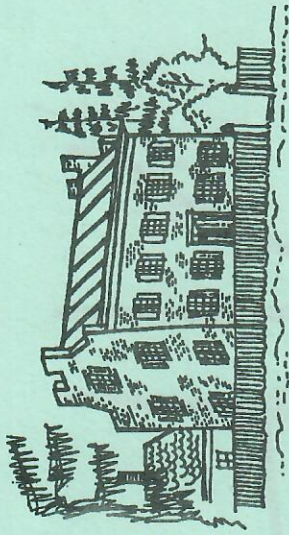
# 3 - House of Many Stairs

Built in 1790. Formerly a tea room, home, and tavern. Beautifully landscaped and furnished in period. Rooms on many levels. Part of the underground railroad. This home is owned and occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Elwood Brant.



# 4 - Quaker School House

This stone house was built in 1858 as a school. Quaker schools preceded public schools, so this school served both Quaker and other children. The school was converted into a home and is owned and occupied by Rev. and Mrs. Walter Hall.



# 5 - The Brick House

Built in 1852 as a wedding present. Known for many years as the Warner House, it was next owned by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Moyer who used the property as a truck farm from 1910 until 1978. Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Clegg then purchased the house and began restoration. Currently owned and occupied by David and Susan Winterle.



# 6 - Ellis-Adlum House

Circa 1771-1778, built by Thomas Ellis of Haverford. Lived in later by Major General John Adlum, friend of Thomas Jefferson. The finest original 18th century woodwork north of Harrisburg. Presently owned and under restoration by Mr. and Mrs. Richard Jones.
