

Ripe with stories, the tiny village of Pennsdale boasts a history rivaled by few places in the Susquehanna Valley.

It is home to what some local historians say may be the county's oldest educational institution and the congregation to hold the most consecutive church services. Both belong to the Society of Friends, or the Quakers.

Nestled amidst rolling farmland, Pennsdale is just a short jaunt off Route 220 in Muncy Township.

"It's off the beaten path, so we don't have the traffic through the village," said Tom Springman, a lifetime resident.

In fact, outsiders seemed somewhat unaware that the cozy village even existed until Interstate 180 was built through the township.

"Until 180 was here, nobody even knew where Pennsdale was. 180 put us on the map," Springman said.

History lovers should be grateful to have discovered this charming village. Many of the stone houses lining Main Street in or near Pennsdale date to more than two centuries ago when the Quakers built rock-solid homes.

According to accounts from numerous historical records, the Society of Friends Muncy Meeting was pioneered by William Ellis toward the end of the 1700s. After Ellis settled just a mile east of Pennsdale, numbers of other Friends followed him to the area.

In 1796 the preparative meeting, a meeting to prepare business matters, was established after having met since 1788 as an indulged, or worship, meeting. About 70 fami-

lies from all over the area met in a log house at that time.


By 1799 that meeting had blossomed so much that the Muncy Monthly Meeting, also called the Pennsdale meeting, was established and a new meeting house was built shortly thereafter. That stone building still stands and is the oldest building in Pennsdale.

Although numbers dwindled in the 1970s, the congregation has gradually grown since then and the Friends continue to worship at what is believed to be the oldest church in the country.

The Friends School House also still stands, although it has since been turned into a home. The stone building was built in 1859 to replace the log structure where both Quaker and non-Quaker children learned to read and write.

Although the school closed when the public schools opened in 1915, some historians say Shady Bank School, as it was called, is the oldest educational institution in Lycoming County.


There was a public elementary school in Pennsdale, but now all Pennsdale children go to schools in Muncy. The previ-

ous school, which is located across the street from the former Quaker school, is now used by a church.

The Quakers were active abolitionists and the Muncy Friends were a regular station of the Underground Railroad.





In furtive night missions, slaves were brought from Catawissa, fed, sheltered and rested, then transported to another Friends settlement in Sullivan County. From there they were taken north to Cana-a to the protection of the British Government.

One of the village's oldest homes was used to hide slaves. The House of Many Stairs, so named because not a single room is on the same level as any other, has a hidden compartment once used to conceal slaves on their way to freedom. Mr. and Mrs. Elwood Brant have occupied the 206-year-old home for 56 years. Mrs. Brant said a friend of hers discovered he secret room when he put his hand against a wall on the upper level and the wall moved. The space behind the wall would house about 12 to 15 people, she said.

The home was built in 1790 "very intriguing." "We haven't changed a thing," she said, except to clean up the home after its 10 uninhabited years.

The history of the name of this village is almost as rich as that of the village itself. It was first called Elizabethtown, then got the local name of Goosetown.

Goosetown was so named because an old man named Joe Capper, who lived in the House of Many Stairs when it functioned as the Bulls Head Tavern, was upset because his neighbor's goose kept getting into his garden. He was so angry he almost took the case to court.

The name then changed to Hicksville when the Hicks family moved into the area. After that the name switched to Pennsville, then became Pennsdale, because there was already a town in Pennsylvania called Pennsville.


From then on, the village has remained Pennsdale, a village residents say is a great place to live and raise children.


